2020 Pulitzer Prize Winner to Judge Lit/South, Headline Lit Up!, & Teach



Jericho Brown is author of the *The Tradition* (Copper Canyon Press, 2019), which won the Pulitzer Prize, the Paterson Poetry Prize, and was a finalist for the National Book Award and the National Book Critics Circle Award.

He is the recipient of fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard, and the National Endowment for the Arts. Brown's first book, *Please* (New Issues, 2008), won the American Book Award. His second book, *The New Testament* (Copper Canyon Press, 2014), won the Anisfield-Wolf Book Award.

His poems have appeared in *The Bennington Review, Buzzfeed, Fence, jubilat, The New Republic, The New York Times, The New Yorker, The Paris Review, TIME magazine,* and several volumes of *The Best American Poetry*. He is the director of the Creative Writing Program and a professor at Emory University.

Writing a Novel or Memoir? Authors Lab Helps You Get It Done, and Better

Writing a novel or memoir? Charlotte Lit's Authors Lab is an intensive program—one, two, or three years, based on your goals—that guides you through the writing of a full-length novel or memoir.

Along with fellow cohort members, you'll participate in programming structured to provide the skills necessary to write, revise, and prepare a full-length manuscript for publication, and support one another in the writing process. In addition to significantly enhancing your craft skills, you'll develop the habits and confidence essential for a lifelong writing practice.



The Lab includes:

• Weekend Intensives. Your full cohort of up to 24 writers will meet at Charlotte Lit every other month for a two-day weekend filled with craft lessons, writing time, coaching, and the power of community.

• Faculty Coaches. You'll be matched with a coach who provides encouragement, teaching, and regular feedback on your work.

• Cohort Community. In addition to the full cohort, you'll also be part of a 6-person subcohort that takes the book journey together, with guidance from your shared coach. Each writer faces the solitary task of putting words onto the page, but that job is easier (and more fun!) with a supportive community.

Anne Lamott said, "Very few writers really know what they are doing until they've done it." This class is a fun way to get you inspired and excited about writing personal

narratives, and is for both non-writers who just want to get their feet wet and anyone who wants a fresh perspective. We'll focus on the art of framing a writing project—thinking, feeling, and writing through the power of memory, while developing a keen "writer's eye." Inspired by advice from noted authors, including Lamott and William Zinsser, we'll jumpstart our writing projects through several visual and writing exercises and leave class with the beginnings of a larger project.

BUILD ME A HUMMINGBIRD OF WORDS: HOW TO DISTILL YOUR LIFE INTO A FLASH

Beth Ann Fennelly, Mississippi Poet Laureate 2016-21

What should we do when we have the urge to write our stories, but we can't figure out how or where to start? This interactive masterclass will provide strategies for those seeking to answer this question. Our spirit animal for this class will be the hummingbird. The hummingbird is the only bird that can fly forward, backward, sideways, and, for short distances, upside down. Precisely because they are so small, hummingbirds can do things other birds can't do. In this class, we'll look at tiny texts and study the things that they can do because they are small. How can attention to the tiniest literary creations challenge and inspire us? Beth Ann will introduce you to word-hummingbirds such as the monostich, the six-word memoir, the aphorism, the ten-second essay, and the American Sentence.

Beth Ann Fennelly, Poet Laureate of Mississippi from 2016-2021, teaches in the M.F.A. Program at the University of Mississippi. Her work has won a Pushcart Prize and three times been included in *The Best American Poetry* series. Fennelly has published three poetry books: *Open House, Tender Hooks,* and *Unmentionables,* and a book of nonfiction, *Great with Child,* all published with W. W. Norton. A novel she co-authored with her husband, Tom Franklin, called

The Tilted World, was published by HarperCollins. Her sixth book, *Heating & Cooling: 52 Micro-Memoirs* (W. W. Norton), was named an Atlanta Journal Constitution Best Book, a Goodreaders Favorite for 2017, and the winner of the Housatonic Book Prize.



Though the natural world tends to figure prominently in eco-poetry, it isn't strictly "nature poetry." With roots in social and restorative (environmental) justice, it's a charged call to environmental awareness, stewardship, and action—"a poetry of witness." A preoccupation of eco-poetry is how the natural world has been habitually and historically subverted by technology and the encroachment of human greed and avarice. We'll review some poems that exemplify eco-poetry and that showcase craft elements that heavily influence the composition of the poem. There will be time for generative writing with an option to share.

Joseph Bathanti is a former poet laureate of North Carolina (2012-14) and recipient of the North Carolina Award in Literature. He is the McFarlane Family Distinguished Professor in Interdisciplinary Education at Appalachian State University in Boone, NC. He served as the 2016 Charles George VA Medical Center Writer-in-Residence in Asheville, NC, and is the co-founder of the Medical Center's Creative Writing Program. *The Act of Contrition & Other Stories*, winner of the EastOver Prize for Fiction, was published in 2022.



WRITING AUTOFICTION: A TWO-DAY IN-TOWN RETREAT

In 1977, French novelist Serge Doubrovsky came up with the term "autofiction" to describe his novel, *Fils.* Autofiction is not simply another name for autobiographical fiction. It might come close to what some writers term memoir, or it might come closer to the ironic metafictional treatments of *Self* popularized by such writers in the 1960s and 70s as Kurt Vonnegut and John Barth. In this course, we will sample it all, reading and writing "fiction of strictly real events or facts" as well as fantastical and allegorical representations of ourselves, using much of our real biographical information, but not much else. If you like the idea of exploring writing that takes you spot between real and imagined versions of yourself, then this is the course for you.

Robin Hemley has published fifteen books of fiction and nonfiction. His most recent books are the autofiction, *Oblivion: An After-Autobiography* (Gold Wake, 2022), *The Art and Craft of Asian Stories: A Writer's Guide and Anthology*, co-authored with Xu Xi (Bloomsbury, 2021) and *Borderline Citizen: Dispatches from the Outskirts of Nationhood* (Nebraska, 2020; Penguin SE Asia, 2021). He has previously published four collections of short stories, and his stories have been widely anthologized. His writing text, *Turning Life into Fiction*, has sold over a hundred thousand copies and has been in print for 25 years.

With her late husband, the poet Kurt Brown, she translated a book by Flemish poet Herman de Coninck, The Plural of Happiness, The recipient of a Pushcart Prize and the editor of five anthologies, she taught at Emerson College, Sarah Lawrence College, University of California, Santa Barbara, and at the Solstice low residency M.F.A. in Creative Writing Program. She served as Santa Barbara's poet laureate from 2019 to 2021.

Malin Pereira, Professor of English and Dean of the Honors College at UNC Charlotte, earned her Ph.D. in English at University of Wisconsin-Madison, with a minor in Afro-American Studies. Following early work on Toni Morrison, her scholarship and teaching have focused on contemporary Black poetry. Her books include *Rita Dove's Cosmopolitanism* and *Into a Light Both Brilliant and Unseen: Conversations with Contemporary Black Poets*. Her most recent publications are on Thylias Moss and Natasha Trethewey. Work in progress includes "A Black Cosmopolitan Poetics" for Cambridge University Press.

READING THE ODYSSEY: COMING HOME FROM WAR

In this five-week course, participants will explore *The Odyssey* as a story of a man trying to come home physically from Troy but emotionally and spiritually as well. His is a magical, fantastical journey that may be almost entirely fiction, but it is also a journey for his wife and son as they navigate his absence and return. During the first week, we'll cover the intro and background around Homer, the Trojan Cycle and the Nostos stories. The following weeks we'll read 6 books ahead, and then discuss the rich discoveries of the text as a group.

Jeffrey Thomson is a poet, memoirist, translator, and editor, and the author of ten books including *Museum of Objects Burned by the Souls in Purgatory* and *Half/Life: New and Selected Poems* from Alice James Books, *The Belfast Notebooks, The Complete Poems of Catullus,* and *From the Fishouse.* He has been an NEA Fellow, the Fulbright Distinguished Scholar in Creative Writing at the Seamus Heaney Poetry Centre at Queen's University Belfast, and the Hodson Trust-John Carter Brown Fellow at Brown University. He is currently professor of creative writing at the University of Maine Farmington.

HOW TO QUERY YOUR NOVEL OR MEMOIR

So often, writers focus their energy on creating compelling finished books, then throw up their hands in frustration when it comes to producing query letters and finding agents. But a good query letter can make the difference between your letter getting deleted and your pages actually getting read. In this class, we'll discuss who these mysterious literary agents are, and the essential five paragraphs that make up a query letter, including the elevator pitch, author bio, and the dreaded comparison books. We'll take a look at some query letters that won the notice of agents. We'll review your elevator pitches and author bios, and discuss whether a good title makes a difference, why rhetorical questions are a no-no, and how you can do a little test marketing.

Betsy Thorpe started in book publishing as an assistant at Atheneum, eventually becoming an acquiring and developmental editor while working at HarperCollins, Broadway Books (Random House), Macmillan, and John Wiley & Sons. She then started Betsy Thorpe Literary Services, which helps authors deliver their best work to the public, either through publishers or selfpublishing. She is the co-author of numerous nonfiction books, including three featured in The New York Times, and has published three novels under the pen name of Hope Carolle with Dragonblade Publishing in 2023.
